Hamming It Up

Freda's Kitchen serves fat, flavorful sandwiches with funny names.

Watch out Corned Beef Row, there's a new Reuben in town—only this one is in Mt. Washington. You'll find this worthy contender at Freda's Kitchen (1604 Kelly Ave., 410-367-7840). Linda and Marty Emmer opened the cafe with their son, Josh, last summer,

offering more than 30 Jewish-style deli and hot sandwiches with playful names like The Pig Pen (ham and Swiss) and That Says It All (chopped liver and onion). But definitely try The Witness Protection (\$8.50), filled with layers of hot corned beef with coleslaw and Russian dressing on rye. If corned beef isn't your thing, there are other items to choose from, all under \$10, including a classic club (\$8.99), vegetarian powerhouse (\$6.50), and BBQ brisket (\$5.99), served on the toasted bread of your choice (there are eight) with a pickle. Some come with a side of sweet, white potato salad. There is also soup, a salad bar (\$6.99 a pound), and a kids' menu. If you're up early enough, you can also catch breakfast until 11:30 a.m. (or all day on Sundays).

Kevyn Matthews rises at 5 a.m. to buy wholesale sweet potatoes and squash from the Restaurant Depot. Next, he swings by local fish markets for fresh tilapia and salmon. He then wields his chef's knife, setting choice cuts of protein atop tiny dices of apples, chickpeas, and kiwi to create 25 or more meals. After four hours of prep work, he'll slide one meal-with a drizzle of yogurt on top-into Greta's dish. Greta is his Doberman pinscher and the inspiration for a business that took four years to create. For \$6 to \$15, Matthews, a 35-year-old Federal Hill resident, will be your furry friend's personal doggy chef. He came up with the idea when walking his dog. "People were like, 'What are you doing to your dog? She looks gorgeous!" he says. Matthews was feeding Greta basil for her breath and avocado to

keep her coat glossy. After careful study of the best and worst ingredients for dogs, Matthews opened his online business (thedogchef@gmail.com) in 2008 and currently delivers in the city and Baltimore County. And if your pup doesn't like what he licks, the meal's on Matthews.
